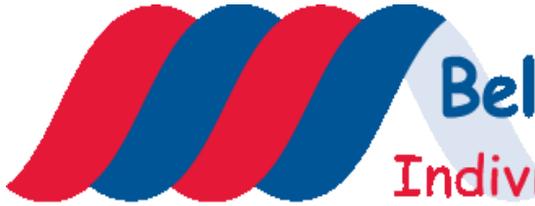

BE SAFE & BE RESPONSIBLE: USE THE SCHOOL CROSSINGS!

Despite regular information and instructions about the need to use the School Crossings when crossing Bellbridge Drive or Matlock Street, we have an increasing number of adults who continue to encourage students to cross the roads in between busy traffic that includes cars, buses and trucks.

It is against the law to cross the road when there is a school crossing so close to our school.

We are asking parents and carers to reinforce the need to use our school crossings and not put our students at risk by walking in between traffic.

Pedestrians

A summary of the key road rules regarding pedestrians in Victoria.

Under the road rules pedestrians are people:

- on foot
- on wheeled devices such as skateboards, rollerblades, wheelchairs and motorised mobility devices
- pushing a bicycle

Rules for pedestrians

Pedestrians are not allowed to:

- cross the road if they are facing an amber or red traffic or pedestrian light
- ***cross the road within 20 metres of a pedestrian crossing - they must use the crossing***
- get out of a moving vehicle
- cross a railway level crossing when it is not allowed
- ***cause a traffic hazard by moving into the path of a driver***
- walk along, or fail to give way when crossing, a path which is for bicycles and wheeled devices (a path showing a 'Bicycle lane' sign).

Pedestrians must:

- use the shortest or most direct way to cross a road
- cross to the nearest edge of the road after getting off a tram
- obey traffic instructions from a police officer
- give way to vehicles at roundabouts

PLEASE USE THE SCHOOL CROSSING.

You will be providing your child with an opportunity to practise what they learn at school about being safe and respectful in relation to traffic rules.

IMPORTANT NOTICE - WHOOPING COUGH

Please note that there has been reported a suspected case of Pertussis (whooping cough) at our school. Detailed information can be found on the Department of Health website at:

An excerpt of some of this information is below:

What is whooping cough?

Whooping cough is a highly contagious disease caused by the bacteria *Bordetella pertussis* and is spread by coughing and sneezing. Whooping cough is very serious in infants under 6 months old. Older children and adults usually have a milder disease. Anyone can contract whooping cough. Immunisation is the best means of protection and it reduces the risk of infection. Immunity fades over time. You can still get whooping cough if you have been immunised, however symptoms are likely to be less severe and not last as long.

What are the symptoms?

Initial symptoms begin like a cold with a blocked or runny nose, followed by a cough which gets worse over the following week. Symptoms include:

- Severe cough, which may develop into bouts of uncontrollable coughing.
- Whoop or gasping sound produced after breathing-in or between coughing bouts (this can sound like hiccups in young babies). This may not be present in every case
- Coughing until vomiting, gagging, or going red in the face
- Some babies may stop breathing for short periods or have difficulty breathing
- The cough can last for more than three weeks, sometimes months, and can be worse at night

What if my child is not vaccinated?

Children less than seven years of age who have not received three doses of a whooping cough vaccine are at higher risk of contracting whooping cough. If they were in the same room with a child diagnosed with whooping cough they will need to be excluded from school, childcare centres, family day care, and any other children's services centres for 14 days after the last exposure, or until they have taken the first five days of a course of the right antibiotics. This exclusion is required by law under the Public Health and Wellbeing legislation.

IMMUNISATION CERTIFICATES REQUIRED

IMPORTANT: Immunisation information required

We have a large number of families who HAVE NOT YET provided our school with a student immunisation status certificate.

By law, this must be provided immediately for every student who does not yet have one on file, in accordance with this information from the Department of Health

(<http://www.health.vic.gov.au/immunisation/factsheets/starting-primary-school.htm>):

Why immunise

- Children starting school are exposed to a large number of people and to a range of potentially dangerous diseases.
- Immunisation is a proven and safe way to be protected against diseases that cause serious illness and sometimes death.
- Enrolling in primary school is a good time to check your child's immunisations are up to date.

What is an immunisation status certificate?

- It is a statement showing the immunisations your child has received.
- By law, you must provide an immunisation status certificate to the primary school when enrolling your child.
- If your child has not received any immunisations, you must still provide a certificate.

- The school keeps a copy of the certificate so that, in the event of a disease outbreak, unimmunised children can be quickly identified and excluded from school until the risk of infection has passed.
- If you do not provide the certificate to the school your child may also be excluded from school as their immunisation status will be unknown.
- Homeopathic treatment is not a legally recognised form of immunisation and cannot be listed on an immunisation status certificate.

How do I obtain an immunisation status certificate?

From the Australian Childhood Immunisation Register

- visit your local Medicare Office.

The most common type of immunisation status certificate is a *Child History Statement* from the Australian Childhood Immunisation Register (ACIR). You will be sent this statement when your child turns five years old, however you can request a certificate at any time. You should also contact ACIR if you:

- are moving or have recently moved, to ensure your contact details are up to date
- think your child's statement is incomplete or incorrect.

From your doctor or local council

If your child is not eligible for a Medicare card, then contact your doctor or local council immunisation service who will be able to assist you in obtaining an immunisation status certificate.

PREP ENROLMENTS FOR 2016

Parents of current students at Bellbridge who have a younger sibling who will be starting Prep in 2016 are strongly encouraged to enrol now.

This month, we will be informing the Education Department of our predicted enrolments and our accuracy in predicting Prep enrolments is critical due to classroom space and staffing.

Please contact the Office if you wish to arrange a tour or a chat with a member of the Leadership Team prior to enrolling.

ASTHMA FORMS

For any student who suffers from Asthma the school must have an action plan in the student's file in case of an emergency. **If your child suffers from Asthma**, please send the form back to school as soon as possible. It is important that we have this information on hand so as we can assist your child effectively.

LATE ARRIVAL/EARLY LEAVERS

Any child arriving to school after 8.30am is required to attend the office, with a parent/guardian, to obtain a late pass. If your child is leaving school early, the parent/guardian is required to send a note with their child on the morning informing the classroom teacher of the time they will be collected and who will be collecting them. The parent/guardian is required to sign the child out at the office, where arrangements will be made for the child to come up to office.

ABSENCE FROM SCHOOL

If your child is absent from school for any reason, we require parents/guardians to notify the school office that they won't be attending. When your child returns to school, a note must be given to their teacher detailing the date and the reason for the absence.

If your child has any long term absences from school, (eg. holidays, extended illness etc) a note is required to be given to their teacher informing them of the absence prior to them commencing the absence.

NEW PHONE SYSTEM

Recently the school has had a new phone system installed. There are now 4 options available to direct your call. **Option 1:** Absent notifications, **Option 2:** Out of School Hours Care, **Option 3:** Canteen and **Option 4:** All other enquires. When you leave a message notifying the school of an absence, please state your child's name, their grade, the date of the absence and the reason for the absence. We are currently having problems understanding some of the messages being left, so please ensure that you state all details in a clear manner.

OUT OF SCHOOLS HOURS CARE

Maths is all around us every day and sharing this everyday maths with children strengthens their understanding and increases their chances of success at school.



Newsletter Maths Tips



Junior shopping activities

Money: Even before children learn about decimals they learn that the left side of the point means dollars and the right side means cents. Draw their attention to prices.
This small packet of biscuits is two dollars fifty. But this big one is three dollars. Which one should we get?

Measurement: The fruit and vegetable section usually has weighing scales and some allow you to print your own price labels as well. This is an opportunity to explore kilograms and grams.

Which one weighed more: the bunch of bananas or the 5 oranges?

How much does a watermelon weigh?

Look at the potatoes. Lift up this bag, its 10kg. This one is 5 kg. You weigh the same as 3 bags of potatoes!

Shape: Grocery packaging uses many different shapes and practicing this vocabulary will help your child learn to describe shape.

Lots of things come in cans. What is this shape called?

A cylinder has round sides and flat ends. What kinds of things get put in cylinders?

Lots of things come in boxes. How many sides does a cereal box have?

Another name for a box is a cuboid.

What kind of fruits are spheres?
